SCHOOL SCHEDULE

Regular school hours:

- Grades 1-4—7:50 a.m. to 2:25 p.m.
- Morning Kindergarten—7:50 a.m. to 10:37 a.m.
- Afternoon Kindergarten—11:37 a.m. to 2:25 p.m.

Delayed opening hours:

- Grades 1-4—9:50 a.m. to 2:25 p.m.
- Morning Kindergarten—9:50 a.m. to 11:37 a.m.
- Afternoon Kindergarten—12:37 a.m. to 2:25 p.m.

Early dismissal hours for days announced on the school calendar (i.e. conferences):

- Grades 1-4—7:50 a.m. to 11:50 a.m.
- Morning Kindergarten—7:50 a.m. to 10:20 a.m.
- Afternoon Kindergarten—9:20 a.m. to 11:50 a.m.

Additional assistance will be provided for kindergarten teachers during the 9:20 a.m. to 10:20 a.m. session overlap.

SIX DAY CYCLE

Along with our regular academic schedule, your child will study five “Special” areas of our curriculum on a “Cycle” basis. These areas include Physical Education (twice during the cycle), Library, Art, Music, or World Language. Our 180 days of school are divided into 30 cycles of 6 days each. Each day your child is in school, he/she will have a “Special.” An example of this would be:

- Day 1Physical Education (wear your sneakers)
- Day 2Library (bring your library book)
- Day 3Music
- Day 4Physical Education (wear your sneakers)
- Day 5World Language
- Day 6Art

Each classroom in our school has its own specific “Special” schedule. You will receive that schedule from your classroom teacher.

It is important to note that we never miss a day! If the school is closed for a holiday or for inclement weather, the next day we are in session will be the next consecutive day of the cycle – we don’t skip cycle days when we skip school.

LUNCH PROGRAM

If your child is purchasing lunch from the school cafeteria, please check the Food Services tab on the district website for cost. Triangle School uses the district's electronic lunch payment system. Students wishing to purchase a school lunch will have a choice of using the debit "Point of Service" (POS) System with the use of a swipe card to pay for their lunches.

Additionally, please note the following;

- The use of this system is voluntary; students may still pay for lunch with cash.
- Deposits into the POS account (cash or checks) should be placed in an envelope and sent to your child's teacher who will send it to the main office. Please clearly mark the envelope with you child's name, teacher's name, and "**POS Program**", otherwise the school will not be able to distinguish that this money is for your child's POS lunch account.
- Deposits by check must have "**POS Program**" written in the note section of the check. Please make checks payable to the "**Hillsborough Township Board of Education.**"
- Only school lunches, beverages and food al la carte items can be debited from the account. Snacks (ice cream, cookies, chips, etc.) cannot be debited from the account.
- We **very strongly** suggest that at least \$5.00 be placed in every child's account for emergencies. If your child does not have lunch or the means to buy lunch, the child will have to call home.

For those who decide to utilize the POS system, it is very important that you keep records of your child's expenses. When the account is low, you must make additional deposits. Account balances can be accessed via the website, www.mymealtime.com.

Again, money may, and should be, placed in the child's account for emergency purposes. Therefore, if you wish to continue to pay with cash, this account may serve as a backup for those days the child forgets his/her money.

Policies and Procedures

(listed alphabetically)

ATTENDANCE

First and foremost, students need to be in school to learn! Actually being in school is a major factor for student success and achievement.

If your child is going to be absent from school, please notify the school before 9:00 am in one of three ways:

1. Enter a note in Genesis via the parent portal (there is an app for your phone too!) or
2. Send an email to: triattendance@htps.us, or
3. Call the Health Office (908)431-6600 and follow the prompts.

Please include your child's name, classroom teacher, and the reason for the absence or lateness. If we do not hear from you, we will contact you to verify your child's absence. Please note that your child must be absent for 2 or more consecutive days before a request for homework can be honored.

School days that are half-days (for example, conference days) are considered full days of attendance.

During a regular day of school, a child must receive instruction for at least four hours in order to be considered present for an entire day (grades 1-4). Children who arrive late to school or who leave school early may be considered to be absent for a day of school.

If your child is going to be absent from school for an extended period of time during which classes are in session (more than one week, for any reason other than a medical one), please contact the school secretary. It may be necessary for you to complete paperwork in order to ensure your child's smooth reinstatement upon your return.

When your child returns to school, it is important to send him or her with a note explaining the reason for the absence. Schools are now required by the state to report numbers of unexcused absences. In the case of illness, an absence is usually considered as excused with a doctor's note. Bringing in a doctor's note is especially important in the case of an extended absence. Parent notes should be submitted in the case of student illness when the child is absent for one day and does not go to the doctor; however, the ultimate determination of absences as excused or unexcused is, according to policy, left to the principal's discretion.

EXCUSED ABSENCES

An absence may be excused for the following reasons:

- Illness (a doctor's note will be required after 3 consecutive days of absence)
- Funeral/Death in the family
- Religious observances pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:36-14 through 16.
- Court obligations
- Take Your Child to Work Day
- Approved Home Instruction
- Exemptions as per Individualized Education Plans or other school-approved accommodation plans for individual disabilities.

Upon the eighteenth (18th) cumulative absence (may be a combination of excused and unexcused) from school the following actions shall be taken:

- A letter from the principal shall be sent to the parent/guardian mandating a parental conference in conjunction with the school counselor to develop an action plan to address patterns of excessive absences and to ensure pupil return to consistent/regular school attendance.
- The student shall be referred to the Intervention & Referral Services Committee for evaluation and recommendations that may include assistance of outside agencies or the courts. Upon such referrals, the I&RS Committee will assess the student's academic, behavioral, and health needs and may consider the assistance of a school-based or a community-based social and health agency or an alternate educational placement.
- The school shall contact DYFS if child abuse or neglect is suspected, make a referral to court programs as designated by the NJ Administrative Office of the Courts, and compel attendance at school in accordance with the statutory and administrative means available, including proceeding to court.

UNEXCUSED ABSENCES

When absences are unexcused, the school shall make a reasonable attempt to notify the student's parents as soon as possible and investigate the cause of the unexcused absences.

Where unexcused absences are deemed an act of truancy on the part of the student, additional consequences will follow. If necessary, the school will work with parents/guardians to develop an action plan designed to address patterns of unexcused absences and to assist in returning the student to regular attendance at school. Where parental neglect is suspected, a referral to the Division of Youth and Family Services will be made and the school will cooperate fully with law enforcement and other state agencies as appropriate.

Upon the **fourth** (4th) cumulative unexcused absence, the following actions shall be taken:

- A letter from the Principal shall be sent to the parent/guardian requesting documentation to explain the absences in the event that any should be considered "excused."
- The school counselor in conjunction with the parent and Principal shall develop an action plan to address patterns of unexcused absences and to ensure the pupils return to consistent/regular school attendance.
- The student shall be referred to the Intervention & Referral Services Committee for evaluation and recommendations that may include assistance of outside agencies or the courts.

For between **five** (5) and **nine** (9) cumulative unexcused absences, the school shall:

- Make a reasonable attempt to notify the student's parents prior to the start of the following day.
- Investigate the cause of the unexcused absence.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of the action plan, and revise the plan if needed and establish outcomes based upon student needs and necessary interventions in coordination with the Intervention & Referral Services Committee and outside agencies, as appropriate.

Upon the **tenth** (10th) cumulative unexcused absence, the following actions shall be taken:

- The school shall make a mandatory referral to the court program as required by the New Jersey Administrative Office of the Courts.
- The school shall make a reasonable effort to notify the parents/guardians in writing of the mandatory referral.
- The school shall continue to consult with the parents/guardians and any involved agencies to support the student's return to regular attendance and cooperate with law enforcement and other agencies as appropriate.
- The school shall compel attendance at school in accordance with the statutory and administrative means available, including proceeding to court.

AFTER SCHOOL CARE

We are often asked about after school care for students. Please be advised that Catholic Charities runs an after school program on the premises of Triangle School. It is important to be aware that this program is solely administered by Catholic Charities and not by the school or the District (this private organization merely uses school facilities). Should you wish to obtain information regarding this program, please contact Catholic Charities directly at 722-1881. (Note: In the event of an emergency early closing of school, the Catholic Charities after-school Program will not be in session and all program participants will be sent home on their regularly assigned buses.)

All parents MUST provide their child's teacher with a note telling them about their child's involvement in the after-school program. If your child attends any daycare other than Catholic Charities, please inform your child's teacher and the main office.

BEFORE SCHOOL CARE

Before school care is not offered on the premises of Triangle School. Students arriving early may wait outside the front door to the building, on the porch. Parents driving students should drop them off at school between 7:40 a.m. and 7:50 a.m. The drop off location is in the lower parking lot. **Please do not drive up to the front of our building,** as buses arrive on different schedules—when one bus leaves, another is often not far behind!

Important note: Students arriving at school after the front doors have closed are considered late. Parents must personally sign in their children to school if they arrive late, and children must receive a pass from the office to be admitted to class.

BEHAVIOR—MAKING GOOD CHOICES

Triangle School students are always encouraged to make good choices and to think about whether their actions will hurt or harm others. We expect our students to:

- 1) be trustworthy;
- 2) be responsible;
- 3) be fair;
- 4) be caring;
- 5) be good citizens; and
- 6) treat people with respect.

Students who are unable to exhibit these qualities will:

- 1) be reported to the adult in charge; and/or
- 2) when appropriate, be provided an opportunity to resolve the conflict using conflict resolution techniques; and/or
- 3) be given a behavior contract in writing; and/or

- 4) be subject to specific consequences that, whenever possible, are most directly related to the inappropriate behavior. For example, a student's seat may be changed, or a student may be denied the opportunity to participate in recess or other activities.

Teachers maintain excellent communication with parents regarding student behavior through phone calls, logs, and/or e-mail contact. In cases where inappropriate behaviors are extreme or repeated, parents will be contacted by the Principal. Severe behavioral concerns may warrant exclusion from class for a period of time or (in rare cases) suspension from school. In these instances parents are contacted and often participate in a conference with the Principal.

Our goals are for students to self-advocate and to use their words to communicate important information when difficult situations arise; understand that our primary concern is for their safety; and learn and grow as a result of the choices they make.

We ask that parents take the time to review this handbook with their children— especially the sections on behavior—so that all expectations are understood and questions can be answered.

COMMUNICATION

In an effort to keep parents well-informed regarding school activities and to promote a positive link between home and school, periodic letters and notices are sent home. Parents are always encouraged to call the school whenever there are questions or a need for clarification. Please make sure you are signed up for “general e-mail” through School Messenger, as we will be sending notices through that system.

CONTACTING STAFF

The staff at Triangle School welcomes your comments, questions, and concerns; however, it is important that regular classroom instruction not be interrupted when information needs to be shared.

We ask that parents not proceed to classrooms during the school day. All parents coming into our school during the school day are asked to sign in at the office, and receive and wear a visitor's badge.

Please feel free to leave a message for a staff member using our voice mail system. When phoning our school at 908-431-6600 press 4 and 4 again to reach Triangle School. Dial the first four letters of the teacher's last name at the prompt and your call will be returned within a reasonable amount of time. ***Please do not leave emergency information of any kind on voicemail.***

Teachers can also be reached via email. The email address is the teacher's first initial and last name, followed by .https.us. Please give teachers a reasonable amount of time to return your email as they often do not get time to return them during the school day. If there is an emergency, please call the main office.

DISCIPLINARY CONSEQUENCES

Each individual teacher within their respective classroom has their own rules for behavior along with rewards and consequences. On the occasions that students display behaviors not in line with our student code of conduct, most issues concerning minor disciplinary infractions will be handled within the classroom by individual teachers. However, when a teacher has exhausted those options, and a child is sent to the principal's office, the following details what the administrative consequences will be.

When it comes to the application of consequences for violations of our student code of conduct, it is the administration's goal to be firm, fair, and consistent in the application of its rules. In this way, we can ensure that we are looking out for the best interest of our entire student body.

Please be aware that while the following guidelines are the general rules that will be followed, the principal has the right and discretion to impose consequences as he sees fit in light of all circumstances involved, particularly but not exclusively, for those behaviors that involve multiple offenses. This may include consequences that go beyond those listed below.

Guidelines for disciplinary consequences:

- **1st referral to the main office-** students will be given a verbal warning and the possibility of a reflective assignment to be completed.
- **2nd referral to the main office-** students will be assigned to silent lunch/recess
- **3rd referral to the main office-** students will be assigned to additional days of silent lunch/recess (maximum 2 per week).
- **4th referral to the main office-** students will be assigned additional days of silent lunch/recess. Students will start to lose school-wide privileges including, but not limited to, participating in special events, class trips, parties, assemblies, etc.
- **5th, 6th, 7th referral to the main office-** students will be assigned to after school detentions and will continue to lose school-wide privileges. Parents are responsible for coming to school to pick up their children in these cases. Transportation is NOT provided.
- **Subsequent referrals could result in in-school or out of school suspension.**

** When students violate transportation procedures and/or school rules on the bus, a suspension from bus privileges may be included with the consequences listed above.

** Please note that **out of school suspension** is a possibility as an initial consequence or at any time for any students who engage in behaviors that may be considered dangerous to themselves or others, as determined by the building cafeteria/recess procedures. Students will be given a 40 minute lunch/recess period each day; 20 minutes to eat in the cafeteria and 20 minutes to play and exercise outside, weather permitting. Students are also expected to follow the guidelines outlined below during lunch and recess so that safe and pleasant atmosphere can be maintained for all students.

DISMISSAL

Each day, to facilitate dismissal, the office and school building will close from 2:10 PM until after the buses have left. If you are picking up your children at the end of the school day, please do not arrive prior to 2:20 PM. If you arrive prior to that time, you will need to wait until all buses have left the driveway, at which time you may sign your child out in the designated area..

Should it become necessary for your child to leave school prior to 2:10, the child must be signed out in the Main Office by a parent. When picking up a child, please come directly to the office, request your child, and wait in the office for the child to meet you. Please send a note in with the child at the beginning of the school day to let both the teacher and the office know that alternate plans for pick-up are being made.

If the child is to be removed from the school by any adult other than his/her parent, it is imperative that the office receives prior permission from the parent to release the child into another person's care. This must be done in writing. **No student may be signed out to any person other than a parent or an adult who is expressly authorized to do so by the parent in writing and by prior arrangement.**

DRESSING FOR SCHOOL

With a focus on maintaining the best learning environment for all students, parents are asked to follow the guidelines below regarding appropriate school attire. Some guidelines pertain directly to student safety; others address appropriateness for the school setting.

We ask that students refrain from wearing the following:

- 1) belly / midriff shirts;
- 2) tank (undershirt-type, narrow straps) / spaghetti strap tops;
- 3) halter / back-out / tube tops;
- 4) mini skirts or short shorts (use the finger tip rule—the hem of shorts /skirts should fall below the fingertips when standing upright with hands at one's sides);
- 5) baggy or sagging pants falling below the waistline;
- 6) No Flipflops!!

During the colder days of fall, winter, and spring, we do try to take the children outside for recess. It is important that students come to school dressed appropriately with coats, hats, and gloves. Children wearing shorts on cold weather days are often uncomfortable for the rest of the school day.

Sneakers are the safest footwear for the playground!

Where some of this clothing is popular outside the school setting, we appreciate parents' help in guiding their children in making good choices about what to wear to school.

EMERGENCY CONTACT INFORMATION

It is critically important that Emergency Contact information be kept accurate and updated in the event that the school needs to reach you. Emergency contact information is maintained in the Forms tab of the Parent Portal on Genesis . Please make sure this form is completed and updated regularly. Should you need to update your child's emergency contact information, please inform the main office and your child's teacher that a change has been made..

EMERGENCY/EARLY DISMISSAL

In the event of an emergency situation, such as severely inclement weather, a serious electrical problem, severe flooding, etc., the Superintendent and the Hillsborough Police Department may call for an emergency/early dismissal of school. ***It is imperative that each parent/guardian discuss with their children what procedures they are to follow when they are delivered home by their buses in these events – especially in the event no one is home.***

In the event of an emergency situation, the Catholic Charities After School Program will **NOT** be in session. All children will be dismissed according to prior arrangements provided by those parents to the Catholic Charities organization.

Timely information may be obtained through any of the following sources: Cable Television: Channel 27, NEWS 12 NJ; Radio WOR (710K), WCTC (1450K), WHWH (1350K); Message Line (Board of Education) 908-431-6600; Web Page: www.https.us. You may also be contacted by our *School Messenger* system.

SCHOOL MESSENGER

School Messenger is a tool for notification and communication. Within minutes of an emergency, school officials can use School Messenger to deliver a message to students' parents or guardians by telephone, cell phone, or e-mail in any combination. School Messenger can also be used to notify you of a school closing due to inclement weather.

SchoolMessenger will be used for emergency broadcasts, bus delays, district and school-wide events, etc. The district will also continue to maintain its other methods of communication, including the Education Access Channel (channel 27), district and school websites, social media sites (including [Facebook](#), [Twitter](#), and [Youtube](#)).

SchoolMessenger gives parents the option to include up to eight (8) parent/ guardian emails and phone numbers to which messages may be sent. Parents can update their own emails and phone numbers via the [Parent Portal](#) . Please note that changes to contact information can take up to 48-hours to populate to SchoolMessenger.

Please remember, if you update an email address that is directly linked to the Genesis Parent Portal as your username, the Portal connection will no longer be accessible. In this case, you will need to contact the school office to alert them of the new email and request that the Genesis Parent Portal link be created with this new email.

As a reminder, we ask that all parents routinely log into their Genesis Parent Portal to review their contact information and make sure everything is up to date. Please notify the main office of any changes.

FOODS OF MINIMAL NUTRITIONAL VALUE

The following items shall not be served, sold, or given away as a free promotion anywhere on school property at any time before the end of the school day, including items served in the reimbursable After School Snack Program:

- Soda Water
- Water Ices – those water ices which contain fruit or fruit juices are not included
- Chewing Gum
- Certain Candies:
 - Hard candy: includes such food as sour balls, fruit balls, candy sticks, lollipops, starlight mints, after dinner mints, sugar wafers, rock candy, cinnamon candies, breath mints, jaw breakers, and cough drops
 - Jellies and Gums: includes such foods as gumdrops, jelly beans, jellied and fruit-flavored slices
 - Marshmallow candies
 - Fondant: includes such foods as candy corn and soft mints
 - Licorice
 - Spun candy
 - Candy-coated popcorn

GUIDANCE SERVICES

Ms. Cordisco, our guidance counselor, serves the students of Triangle School. Ms. Cordisco works with students both individually and in groups, the most notable of which are the Friendship Club and Peer Leaders. Students can make

arrangements to see her during the day if they have concerns they would like to discuss. Friendship Club provides an opportunity for students to interact with others in a productive manner and often assists them in developing positive relationships with their peers. Peer Leaders are students recommended by their teachers who observe that they have the potential to be positive peer role models. They meet to discuss a variety of topics; students sometimes create and present lessons to younger students.

HOME AND SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

Triangle School is fortunate to benefit from the efforts and talents of an active, caring Home and School Association. All parents are urged to support and actively participate in this worthy organization.. Should you wish to contact our officers or have any questions regarding our HSA, you can make the connection by email at TriangleHSA@gmail.com.

The Triangle Home and School Association meets monthly to review activities that have taken place, plan upcoming committee projects, and share special programs. All meetings are held in our media center.

HOMEWORK

As a general guideline, students receive homework in an amount equivalent to approximately 10 minutes multiplied by their current grade level. For example, fourth graders would receive approximately 40 minutes of homework per night; third graders approximately 30 minutes, and so on. If students have difficulty understanding their homework assignment, rather than having them struggle for an inordinate amount of time, suggest that they complete what they can and ask their teacher about the assignment during the next day at school.

In addition to the many subjects we teach, we also teach to build character, focusing on topics such as responsibility. As regards homework, **we strongly discourage students from returning to school after hours should they forget a book or a homework assignment. In the event of an emergency situation when a child must return for something left at school, the child must be accompanied by his or her parent, and a custodian must be present to allow access into the classroom.** Please note that the building is locked between 3:00 & 6:30 p.m., so you will be unable to enter the building during those hours.

If your child will be absent for more than two days of school, you may contact the Health Office at 431-6600, press 4, then 4, then 1 **before 9:00 a.m.** and leave a message requesting that work be sent home for your child. The nurse will then contact the classroom teacher on your behalf. Please note that requests are most easily honored when they are made early in the school day (by 9:00 a.m.), as it is likely that the teacher will need to prepare a packet to go home for your child. Homework can be picked up between 2:30 & 3:00 p.m. or after 6:30 p.m.

When leaving a message requesting homework, please state your child's name, the name of your child's classroom teacher, and the means by which you wish the work to arrive (i.e. sent home with another child, parent pick-up). Please be aware that if you are picking up work in the office, you should plan to do so after student dismissal, allowing the teacher time to assemble the work. The work will be left for you on the counter in the Main Office.

LATE ARRIVALS TO SCHOOL

All students are encouraged to arrive at school on time and ready to start their day; however, we realize that there are times when a student may occasionally arrive to school late. **Should your child arrive late to school, please bring the child directly to the Main Office, where a late pass will be issued. Parents must be present to sign in children when they are late to school.**

It is important to note that a child who arrives after the bell has rung due to district transportation arrangements (such as

the late arrival of a bus) is not considered to be late and is in no way penalized.

If your child is to be late in his or her arrival to school on a particular day, please call the Health Office, and leave that message for the nurse.

LUNCH/RECESS BEHAVIOR

- ❖ Students are expected to follow the directions given by the teacher and lunch aide the first time they are given.
- ❖ Students are expected to demonstrate respect for the lunch aides and others at all times.
- ❖ Students should remain seated during the lunch period and keep hands, feet, and other objects to themselves.
- ❖ Running in the cafeteria is not permitted.
- ❖ Lunchtime conversations should be conducted in a quiet voice. Students should refrain from yelling, shouting, or making other loud noises.
- ❖ Students are responsible for discarding their trash and cleaning up their area.
- ❖ Once students leave the cafeteria, they are expected to walk quietly to the playground or classroom.

RECESS

- ❖ Students are expected to follow directions the first time they are given.
- ❖ Students are expected to demonstrate respect for the lunch aides and others at all times.
- ❖ Students are to play in designated areas only.
- ❖ Students should refrain from any type of rough play which could result in jeopardizing the safety and well-being of themselves or another student. This includes chasing one another and playing tag. **Fighting is strictly prohibited.**
- ❖ The use of foul or inappropriate language is not permitted.
- ❖ At the end of the recess period, students are expected to line up quickly and re-enter the building in a quiet, orderly manner.

Consequences: Students who fail to abide by the guidelines outlined above will be subject to the following consequences:

- 1st time- Warning
- 2nd time- Loss of recess privileges
- 3rd time- Sent to the principal.

Any serious offense, such as fighting, stealing, bullying, etc. will result in the student being referred immediately to the principal for discipline.

LOST AND FOUND

We strongly suggest that you label all jackets, sweaters, lunch boxes, backpacks, etc. that your child brings to school each day. Our lost and found bin can be accessed by asking our main office staff. It often fills up with items that go unclaimed. Several times during the year we forward these items to a charitable organization.

PARKING

If you are coming to school when classes are in session, **please park in the lower lot or in the church lot across the street.** The parking lot directly in front of the school is intended for staff use. Please always refrain from parking in a spot designated for a staff member. Your cooperation is appreciated!

When parking on school premises for any reason, it is important that you take care that you are not blocking another vehicle, or a building entrance, or the parking lot entrance or exit.

PARKING LOT SAFETY

We ask your help to ensure the safety of all children. Please note the following:

- 1) Cars are not permitted to enter the driveway when school buses are in the driveway - no matter what time of the day. Use the lower lot or church lot.
- 2) Enter the driveway ONLY after 7:55 a.m. and provided that no buses are present. Please do not enter before that time. Children should be dropped off at school in our lower lot.
- 3) In the afternoon, cars are not permitted between 2:00 p.m. and 2:25 p.m.
- 4) When driving through the lot at any time, use caution, and proceed slowly.
- 5) “K” turning in the driveway to go out the entrance is prohibited.
- 6) Do not enter the driveway through the exit.
- 7) Park only in designated spaces.
- 8) It is illegal to stop on South Triangle Road to drop off children.

PARTIES

Birthday parties are not permitted in school.

Classroom celebrations occur 3 times per year. New Jersey enacted a School Nutrition Policy to promote healthy food alternatives to students in public schools. In addition to changes to the cafeteria menu, the policy affects foods that are served during parties and birthday celebrations. Soda is completely prohibited, as is all candy.

If your child would like to acknowledge their birthday in class, we highly recommend that parents avoid sending in edible treats. Below is a list of ideas for non-food items that could be sent in to celebrate your child’s special day:

- Donate a picture book for the class library (to be read on your child’s birthday).
- Donate a game for our class game center (to be used during indoor recess).
- Pencils
- Erasers
- Stickers

If you have any other ideas or questions, feel free to call or email your child’s teacher.

***PLEASE DO NOT SEND ANY GOODY-BAGS WITH FOOD ITEMS TO SCHOOL.**

REPORT CARDS

The purpose of reporting the educational progress of pupils is to:

- 1) inform parents/guardians of the progress children have made in school;
- 2) apprise pupils of their progress in school;
- 3) prompt teachers to make periodic, formal assessments of each pupil's progress;
- 4) provide a cumulative record of a pupil's progress through the educational system;
- 5) enable each pupil to gain a positive sense of his or her intellectual, social, emotional, and physical abilities and growth towards effective citizenship.

Report cards will be available online on the Parent Portal at the end of each of the four marking periods in the school year.

SCHOOL REPORT CARD

The State of New Jersey publishes report cards for each school in each district. These report cards provide information about school and district demographics, as well as state assessment scores, budget information, and more. To access these report cards and other No Child Left Behind data, go to <http://education.state.nj.us/rc>.

TRANSPORTATION

Information regarding the location and times of your child's designated bus stop is provided to parents via Genesis . Students are encouraged to take advantage of the availability of district transportation. Should you need to contact the transportation office for any reason, please call 431-6600.

All students are expected to ride their regular buses to and from Triangle School. *Children are not permitted to ride a bus other than the one to which they are assigned.* In the event of an emergency, children are permitted to get off at a different stop on their same bus provided the Principal provides a note to the bus driver. In order to do allow your child to do so, you must follow the following procedure:

- 1) Parents must make contact with the main office about the situation, in writing.
- 2) The principal will determine if there is an actual emergency and whether or not the emergency stop change will be granted.
- 3) Please allow the Principal sufficient time to contact transportation and alert them of the approval along with your student's name and emergency bus stop.
- 4) Please allow the transportation department sufficient time to contact the bus company and have them relay the information to their driver.
- 5) The Triangle School main office will contact you to confirm the switch.

- 6) A school staff member will bring the student to the bus and present a signed note from the Principal which will include the student's name and emergency bus stop.

Only under these procedures will a bus stop switch be allowed.

Although drivers usually check their buses after each run and attempt to match up lost items with the children and schools to which they belong, drivers are not responsible for things left on the bus.

Older students may ride bicycles to and from school—however, a note, signed by a parent, must be submitted to the office if a child will be using this form of transportation.

Private vehicles are not permitted in the school driveway when buses are present or expected! Should you be transporting your child to school or collecting your child from school on any given day, please be certain not to interfere with the school buses! You will need to park in the lower lot and walk your child to the main entrance, or park and meet your child at the main entrance.

VACATIONS DURING THE SCHOOL YEAR

Family vacations are not considered as excused absences. Absences for family vacations during the school year are strongly discouraged. It is difficult to make up the experiences your child will miss being in the classroom. If a child becomes ill during a family vacation, this is not considered as an excused sick day absence from school.

WITHDRAWAL / STUDENT TRANSFER

If your family will be relocating, or if it is your intention to register your child to attend a private school, it is necessary for you to make an appointment to speak with the school secretary. She will advise you of the procedures that need to be followed in order to ensure legal withdrawal and timely transfer of records.

8505 SCHOOL NUTRITION

The Board of Education recognizes child and adolescent obesity has reached epidemic levels in the United States and that poor diet combined with the lack of physical activity negatively impacts on pupils' health and their ability and motivation to learn. The Board is committed to: providing pupils with healthy and nutritious foods; encouraging the consumption of fresh fruits and vegetables, fat-free or low fat milk (1%) and whole grains; supporting healthy eating through nutrition education; encouraging pupils to select and consume all components of the school meal; and providing pupils with the opportunity to engage in daily physical activity.

All reimbursable meals shall meet Federal nutrient standards as required by the U.S. Department of Agriculture Child Nutrition Program regulations. All items served as part of an After School Snack Program shall meet the standards as outlined within this Policy.

The following items may not be served, sold, or given out as free promotion anywhere on school property at anytime before the end of the school day:

1. Foods of minimal nutritional value (FMNV) as defined by U.S. Department of Agriculture regulations;
2. All food and beverage items listing sugar, in any form, as the first ingredient; and
3. All forms of candy.

Schools shall reduce the purchase of any products containing trans fats. Federal labeling of trans fats on all food products is required by January 1, 2006.

All snack and beverage items sold or served anywhere on school property during the school day, including items sold in a la carte lines, vending machines, snack bars, school stores, and fundraisers, or served in the reimbursable After School Snack Program, shall meet the following standards:

1. Based on manufacturers' nutritional data or nutrient facts labels:
 - a. No more than eight grams of total fat per serving, with the exception of nuts and seeds.
 - b. No more than two grams of saturated fat per serving.
2. All beverages shall not exceed 12 ounces, with the following exceptions:
 - a. Water.
 - b. Milk

Schools shall make potable water available to children at no charge in the place where lunch meals are served during the meal service. Schools may offer water pitchers with cups on tables and/or make potable water available for pupils to fill their own cups or water bottles by means of a water faucet or water fountain that is available without restriction in or near the location meals are served. A faucet or fountain outside the cafeteria is acceptable as long as pupils can request and receive permission to access the faucet or fountain.

Schools may not serve any whole milk or any reduced fat milk (2%). Schools may only serve fat-free milk, low-fat (1%) milk, fat free or low fat lactose reduced/lactose free milk, fat-free or low-fat buttermilk, or acidified milk or fat-free or low-fat acidified milk. Schools must offer at least two choices of these milks. Fat-free milk may be flavored or unflavored while low fat (1%) milk must be unflavored. All milk products must be pasteurized fluid milk that meets the State and local standards, as currently required in 7 CFR Part 210.10(m)(1)(ii).

In elementary schools, 100% of all beverages offered shall be milk, water, or 100% fruit or vegetable juices.

In middle and high schools, at least 60% of all beverages offered, other than milk and water, shall be 100% fruit or vegetable juices. No more than 40% of all ice cream/frozen desserts shall be allowed to exceed the standards in this Policy for sugar, fat, and saturated fat.

Food and beverages served during special school celebrations or during curriculum related activities shall be exempt from this Policy, with the exception of foods of minimal nutritional value as defined by USDA regulations.

This Policy does not apply to: medically authorized special needs diets pursuant to 7 CFR Part 210; school nurses using FMNVs during the course of providing health care to individual pupils; or special needs pupils whose Individualized Education Plan (IEP) indicates their use for behavior modification.

Adequate time shall be allowed for pupil meal service and consumption. The school district shall provide a pleasant dining environment for pupils, and schools shall attempt to schedule physical education or recess before lunch whenever possible.

The school district's curriculum shall incorporate nutrition education and physical activity consistent with the New Jersey Department of Education Core Curriculum Standards.

The Board of Education is committed to promoting this School Nutrition Policy with all food service personnel, teachers, nurses, coaches, and other school administrative staff so they have the skills needed to implement this Policy and promote healthy eating practices. The Board will work toward expanding awareness about this Policy among pupils, parent(s) or legal guardian(s), teachers, and the community at large.

5200 ATTENDANCE

The Board of Education requires the pupils enrolled in the schools of this district attend school regularly in accordance with the laws of the State. The educational program offered by this district is predicated on the presence of the pupil and requires continuity of instruction and classroom participation. The regular contact of pupils with one another in the classroom and their participation in a well-planned instructional activity under the tutelage of a competent teacher are vital to this purpose.

Attendance at school may be excused for certain absences as defined by the Board. All absences for reasons other than excused, shall be unexcused.

Pupils absent from school for any reason are responsible for the completion of assignments missed because of their absence. No pupil excused for a religious holiday shall be deprived of an award or eligibility to compete for an award or the opportunity to make up a test given on the religious holiday.

Prolonged or repeated absences, excused or unexcused, from school or from class, deprive the pupil of the classroom experience deemed essential to learning and may result in retention at grade level or loss of credit toward the high school diploma in accordance with policies of this Board.

Pupils shall be subjected to the school district response for unexcused absences during the school year as outlined in N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.8(a)4 and Regulation 5200. In addition, unexcused absences from school or from classes within the school day shall subject a pupil to the disciplinary rules of the Board, which may include the denial of a pupil's participation in co-curricular activities and/or athletic competition in accordance with Policy Nos. 5610 and 5620.

The Superintendent shall calculate and monitor the average daily attendance rate for the district and for each school in the district. Whenever the average daily attendance rate for the district or for a school in the district does not meet the New Jersey Department of Education requirements, the Superintendent or designee shall develop performance objectives to improve pupil attendance pursuant to N.J.A.C. 6A:32-12.2(a)3.

A. Policy Statement

The Board of Education prohibits acts of harassment, intimidation, or bullying of a student. A safe and civil environment in school is necessary for students to learn and achieve high academic standards. Harassment, intimidation, or bullying, like other disruptive or violent behaviors, is conduct that disrupts both a student's ability to learn and a school's ability to educate its students in a safe and disciplined environment. Since students learn by example, school administrators, faculty, staff and volunteers should be commended for demonstrating appropriate behavior, treating others with civility and respect, and refusing to tolerate harassment, intimidation, or bullying.

For the purposes of this Policy, the term "parent," pursuant to N.J.A.C. 6A:16-1.3, means the natural parent(s) or adoptive parent(s), legal guardian(s), foster parent(s), or parent surrogate(s) of a student. Where parents are separated or divorced, "parent" means the person or agency which has legal custody of the student, as well as the natural or adoptive parent(s) of the student, provided such parental rights have not been terminated by a court of appropriate jurisdiction.

B. Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Definition

"Harassment, intimidation, or bullying" means any gesture, any written, verbal or physical act, or any electronic communication, as defined in N.J.S.A. 18A:37-14, whether it be a single incident or a series of incidents that:

1. Is reasonably perceived as being motivated by either any actual or perceived characteristic, such as race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, or a mental, physical or sensory disability; or by any other distinguishing characteristic;
2. Takes place on school property, at any school-sponsored function, on a school bus, or off school grounds, as provided for in N.J.S.A. 18A:37-15.3;
3. Substantially disrupts or interferes with the orderly operation of the school or the rights of other students;
and that

- a. A reasonable person should know, under the circumstances, that the act(s) will have the effect of physically or emotionally harming a student or damaging the student's property, or placing a student in reasonable fear of physical or emotional harm to his/her person or damage to his/her property; or
- b. Has the effect of insulting or demeaning any student or group of students; or
- c. Creates a hostile educational environment for the student by interfering with a student's education or by severely or pervasively causing physical or emotional harm to the student.

Schools are required to address harassment, intimidation, and bullying occurring off school grounds, when there is a nexus between the harassment, intimidation, and bullying and the school (e.g., the harassment, intimidation, or bullying substantially disrupts or interferes with the orderly operation of the school or the rights of other students).

"Electronic communication" means a communication transmitted by means of an electronic device, including, but not limited to: a telephone, cellular phone, computer, or pager.

C. Student Expectations

The Board expects students to conduct themselves in keeping with their levels of development, maturity and demonstrated capabilities with proper regard for the rights and welfare of other students and school staff, the educational purpose underlying all school activities and the care of school facilities and equipment consistent with the Code of Student Conduct.

The Board believes that standards for student behavior must be set cooperatively through interaction among the students, parents, school employees, school administrators, school volunteers, and community representatives, producing an atmosphere that encourages students to grow in self-discipline. The development of this atmosphere requires respect for self and others, as well as for school district and community property on the part of students, staff, and community members.

Students are expected to behave in a way that creates a supportive learning environment. The Board believes the best discipline is self-imposed, and it is the responsibility of staff to use instances of violations of the Code of Student Conduct as opportunities to help students learn to assume and accept responsibility for their behavior and the consequences of their behavior. Staff members who interact with students shall apply best practices designed to prevent student conduct problems and foster students' abilities to grow in self-discipline.

The Board expects that students will act in accordance with the student behavioral expectations and standards regarding harassment, intimidation, and bullying, including:

1. Student responsibilities (e.g., requirements for students to conform to reasonable standards of socially accepted behavior; respect the person, property and rights of others; obey constituted authority; and respond to those who hold that authority);
2. Appropriate recognition for positive reinforcement for good conduct, self-discipline, and good citizenship;
3. Student rights; and
4. Sanctions and due process for violations of the Code of Student Conduct.

Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:37-15(a) and N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.1(a)1, the district has involved a broad-base of school and community members, including parents, students, instructional staff, student support services staff, school administrators, and school volunteers, as well as community organizations, such as faith-based, health and human service, business and law enforcement, in the development of this Policy. Based on locally determined and accepted core ethical values adopted by the Board, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.1(a)2, the Board must develop guidelines for student conduct pursuant to N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.1. These guidelines for student conduct will take into consideration the developmental ages of students, the severity of the offenses and students' histories of inappropriate behaviors, and the mission and physical facilities of the individual school(s) in the district. This Policy requires all students in the district to adhere to the rules established by the school district and to submit to the remedial and consequential measures that are appropriately assigned for infractions of these rules.

Pursuant to N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.1, the Superintendent must annually provide to students and their parents the rules of the district regarding student conduct. Provisions shall be made for informing parents whose primary language is other than English.

The district prohibits active or passive support for acts of harassment, intimidation, or bullying. Students are encouraged to support other students who:

1. Walk away from acts of harassment, intimidation, and bullying when they see them;
 2. Constructively attempt to stop acts of harassment, intimidation, or bullying;
 3. Provide support to students who have been subjected to harassment, intimidation, or bullying; and
 4. Report acts of harassment, intimidation, and bullying to the designated school staff member.
- D. Consequences and Appropriate Remedial Actions

Consequences and Appropriate Remedial Actions – Students

The Board of Education requires its school administrators to implement procedures that ensure both the appropriate consequences and remedial responses for students who commit one or more acts of harassment, intimidation, or bullying, consistent with the Code of Student Conduct. The following factors, at a minimum, shall be given full consideration by school administrators in the implementation of appropriate consequences and remedial measures for each act of harassment, intimidation, or bullying by students. Appropriate consequences and remedial actions are those that are graded according to the severity of the offense(s), consider the developmental ages of the student offenders and students' histories of inappropriate behaviors, per the Code of Student Conduct and N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.

Factors for Determining Consequences – Student Considerations

1. Age, developmental and maturity levels of the parties involved and their relationship to the school district;
2. Degrees of harm;
3. Surrounding circumstances;
4. Nature and severity of the behavior(s);
5. Incidences of past or continuing patterns of behavior;
6. Relationships between the parties involved; and
7. Context in which the alleged incidents occurred.

Factors for Determining Consequences – School Considerations

1. School culture, climate, and general staff management of the learning environment;
2. Social, emotional, and behavioral supports;
3. Student-staff relationships and staff behavior toward the student;
4. Family, community, and neighborhood situation; and
5. Alignment with Board policy and regulations/procedures.

Factors for Determining Remedial Measures

Personal

1. Life skill deficiencies;
2. Social relationships;
3. Strengths;
4. Talents;
5. Interests;
6. Hobbies;
7. Extra-curricular activities;
8. Classroom participation;
9. Academic performance; and
10. Relationship to students and the school district.

Environmental

1. School culture;
2. School climate;
3. Student-staff relationships and staff behavior toward the student;
4. General staff management of classrooms or other educational environments;
5. Staff ability to prevent and manage difficult or inflammatory situations;
6. Social-emotional and behavioral supports;
7. Social relationships;
8. Community activities;
9. Neighborhood situation; and
10. Family situation.

Consequences for a student who commits one or more acts of harassment, intimidation, or bullying may range from positive behavioral interventions up to and including suspension or expulsion of students, as set forth in the Board's approved Code of Student Conduct pursuant to N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.1. Consequences for a student who commits an act of harassment, intimidation, or bullying are those that are graded according to the severity of the offenses, consider the developmental age of the student offenders and the students' histories of inappropriate behaviors consistent with the Board's approved Code of Student Conduct and N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7, Student Conduct. The use of negative consequences should occur in conjunction with remediation and not be relied upon as the sole intervention approach.

Remedial measures shall be designed to correct the problem behavior, prevent another occurrence of the problem, protect and provide support for the victim of the act, and take corrective action for documented systemic problems related to harassment, intimidation, or bullying. The consequences and remedial measures may include, but are not limited to, the examples listed below:

Examples of Consequences

1. Admonishment;
2. Temporary removal from the classroom;
3. Deprivation of privileges;
4. Classroom or administrative detention;
5. Referral to disciplinarian;
6. In-school suspension
7. Out-of-school suspension (short-term or long-term);
8. Reports to law enforcement or other legal action; or
9. Expulsion

Examples of Remedial Measures

Personal – Student Exhibiting Bullying Behavior

1. Develop a behavioral contract with the student. Ensure the student has a voice in the outcome and can identify ways he or she can solve the problem and change behaviors;
2. Meet with parents to develop a family agreement to ensure the parent and student understand school rules and expectations;
3. Explain the long-term negative consequences of harassment, intimidation, and bullying on all involved;
4. Ensure understanding of consequences, if harassment, intimidation, and bullying behavior continues;
5. Meet with school counselor, school social worker, or school psychologist to decipher mental health issues (e.g., what is happening and why?);
6. Develop a learning plan that includes consequences and skill building;
7. Consider wrap-around support services or after-school programs or services;
8. Provide social skill training, such as impulse control, anger management, developing empathy, and problem solving;
9. Arrange for an apology, preferably written;
10. Require a reflective essay to ensure the student understands the impact of his or her actions on others;
11. Have the student research and teach a lesson to the class about bullying, empathy, or a similar topic;
12. Arrange for restitution (i.e., compensation, reimbursement, amends, repayment), particularly when personal items were damaged or stolen;
13. Explore age-appropriate restorative (i.e., healing, curative, recuperative) practices; and
14. Schedule a follow-up conference with the student.

Personal – Target/Victim

1. Meet with a trusted staff member to explore the student's feelings about the incident;
2. Develop a plan to ensure the student's emotional and physical safety at school;
3. Have the student meet with the school counselor or school social worker to ensure he or she does not feel responsible for the bullying behavior;
4. Ask students to log behaviors in the future;
5. Help the student develop skills and strategies for resisting bullying; and
6. Schedule a follow-up conference with the student.

Parents, Family, and Community

1. Develop a family agreement;
2. Refer the family for family counseling; and

3. Offer parent education workshops related to bullying and social-emotional learning.

Examples of Remedial Measures – Environmental (Classroom, School Building, or School District)

1. Analysis of existing data to identify bullying issues and concerns;
2. Use of findings from school surveys (e.g., school climate surveys);
3. Focus groups;
4. Mailings – postal and email;
5. Cable access television;
6. School culture change;
7. School climate improvement;
8. Increased supervision in “hot spots” (e.g. locker rooms, hallways, playgrounds, cafeterias, school perimeters, buses);
9. Adoption of evidence-based systemic bullying prevention practices and programs;
10. Training for all certificated and non-certificated staff to teach effective prevention and intervention skills and strategies;
11. Professional development plans for involved staff;
12. Participation of parents and other community members and organizations (e.g., Parent Teacher Associations, Parent Teacher Organizations) in the educational program and in problem-solving bullying issues;
13. Formation of professional learning communities to address bullying problems;
14. Small or large group presentations for fully addressing the actions and the school’s response to the actions, in the context of the acceptable student and staff member behavior and the consequences of such actions;
15. School policy and procedure revisions;
16. Modifications of schedules;
17. Adjustments in hallway traffic;
18. Examination and adoption of educational practices for actively engaging students in the learning process and in bonding students to pro-social institutions and people;
19. Modifications in student routes or patterns traveling to and from school;
20. Supervision of student victims before and after school, including school transportation;
21. Targeted use of monitors (e.g., hallway, cafeteria, locker room, playground, school perimeter, bus);
22. Targeted use of teacher aides;
23. Disciplinary action, including dismissal, for school staff who contributed to the problem;
24. Supportive institutional interventions, including participation in the Intervention and Referral Services Team, pursuant to N.J.A.C. 6A:16-8;
25. Parent conferences;
26. Family counseling;
27. Development of a general harassment, intimidation, and bullying response plan;
28. Behavioral expectations communicated to students and parents;
29. Participation of the entire student body in problem-solving harassment, intimidation, and bullying issues;
30. Recommendations of a student behavior or ethics council;
31. Participation in peer support groups;
32. School transfers; and
33. Involvement of law enforcement officers, including school resource officers and juvenile officers or other appropriate legal action.

Consequences and Appropriate Remedial Actions – Adults

The district will also impose appropriate consequences and remedial actions to an adult who commits an act of harassment, intimidation, or bullying of a student. The consequences may include, but not be limited to: verbal or written reprimand, increment withholding, legal action, disciplinary action, termination, and/or bans from providing services, participating in school district-sponsored programs, or being in school buildings or on school grounds. Remedial measures may include, but not be limited to: in or out-of-school counseling, professional development programs, and work environment modifications.

Target/Victim Support

Districts should identify a range of strategies and resources that will be available to individual victims of harassment, intimidation, and bullying, and respond in a manner that provides relief to victims and does not stigmatize victims or further their sense of persecution. The type, diversity, location, and degree of support are directly related to the student’s perception of safety.

Sufficient safety measures should be undertaken to ensure the victims’ physical and social-emotional well-being and their ability to learn in a safe, supportive, and civil educational environment.

Examples of support for student victims of harassment, intimidation, and bullying include:

1. Teacher aides;
2. Hallway and playground monitors;
3. Partnering with a school leader;
4. Provision of an adult mentor;
5. Assignment of an adult “shadow” to help protect the student;
6. Seating changes;
7. Schedule changes;
8. School transfers;
9. Before- and after-school supervision;
10. School transportation supervision;
11. Counseling; and
12. Treatment or therapy.

E. Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Reporting Procedure

The Board of Education requires the Principal at each school to be responsible for receiving complaints alleging violations of this Policy. All Board members, school employees, and volunteers and contracted service providers who have contact with students are required to verbally report alleged violations of this Policy to the Principal or the Principal’s designee on the same day when the individual witnessed or received reliable information regarding any such incident. All Board members, school employees, and volunteers and contracted service providers who have contact with students, also shall submit a report in writing to the Principal within two school days of the verbal report. The Principal will inform the parents of all students involved in alleged incidents, and, as appropriate, may discuss the availability of counseling and other intervention services. The Principal, upon receiving a verbal or written report, may take interim measures to ensure the safety, health, and welfare of all parties pending the findings of the investigation.

Students, parents, and visitors are encouraged to report alleged violations of this Policy to the Principal on the same day when the individual witnessed or received reliable information regarding any such incident. Students, parents, and visitors may report an act of harassment, intimidation, or bullying anonymously. Formal action for violations of the Code of Student Conduct may not be taken solely on the basis of an anonymous report.

A Board member or school employee who promptly reports an incident of harassment, intimidation, or bullying and who makes this report in compliance with the procedures set forth in this Policy, is immune from a cause of action for damages arising from any failure to remedy the reported incident.

In accordance with the provisions of N.J.S.A. 18A:37-18, the harassment, intimidation, and bullying law does not prevent a victim from seeking redress under any other available law, either civil or criminal, nor does it create or alter any tort liability.

The district may consider every mechanism available to simplify reporting, including standard reporting forms and/or web-based reporting mechanisms. For anonymous reporting, the district may consider locked boxes located in areas of a school where reports can be submitted without fear of being observed.

A school administrator who receives a report of harassment, intimidation, and bullying from a district employee, and fails to initiate or conduct an investigation, or who should have known of an incident of harassment, intimidation, or bullying and fails to take sufficient action to minimize or eliminate the harassment, intimidation, or bullying, may be subject to disciplinary action.

F. Anti-Bullying Coordinator, Anti-Bullying Specialist, and School Safety Team(s)

1. The Superintendent shall appoint a district Anti-Bullying Coordinator. The Superintendent shall make every effort to appoint an employee of the school district to this position.

The district Anti-Bullying Coordinator shall:

- a. Be responsible for coordinating and strengthening the school district’s policies to prevent, identify, and address harassment, intimidation, or bullying of students;
- b. Collaborate with school Anti-Bullying Specialists in the district, the Board of Education, and the Superintendent to prevent, identify, and respond to harassment, intimidation, or bullying of students in the district;
- c. Provide data, in collaboration with the Superintendent, to the Department of Education regarding harassment, intimidation, or bullying of students;

d. Execute such other duties related to school harassment, intimidation, or bullying as requested by the Superintendent; and

e. Meet at least twice a school year with the school Anti-Bullying Specialist(s) to discuss and strengthen procedures and policies to prevent, identify, and address harassment, intimidation, and bullying in the district.

2. The Principal in each school shall appoint a school Anti-Bullying Specialist. The Anti-Bullying Specialist shall be a guidance counselor, school psychologist, or other certified staff member trained to be the Anti-Bullying Specialist from among the currently employed staff in the school.

The school Anti-Bullying Specialist shall:

a. Chair the School Safety Team as provided in N.J.S.A. 18A:37-21;

a. Lead the investigation of incidents of harassment, intimidation, or bullying in the school; and

b. Act as the primary school official responsible for preventing, identifying, and addressing incidents of harassment, intimidation, or bullying in the school.

3. A School Safety Team shall be formed in each school in the district to develop, foster, and maintain a positive school climate by focusing on the on-going, systemic operational procedures and educational practices in the school, and to address issues such as harassment, intimidation, or bullying that affect school climate and culture. Each School Safety Team shall meet, at a minimum, two times per school year. The School Safety Team shall consist of the Principal or the Principal's designee who, if possible, shall be a senior administrator in the school and the following appointees of the Principal: a teacher in the school; a school Anti-Bullying Specialist; a parent of a student in the school; and other members to be determined by the Principal. The school Anti-Bullying Specialist shall serve as the chair of the School Safety Team.

The School Safety Team shall:

a. Receive records of all complaints of harassment, intimidation, or bullying of students that have been reported to the Principal;

b. Receive copies of all reports prepared after an investigation of an incident of harassment, intimidation, or bullying;

c. Identify and address patterns of harassment, intimidation, or bullying of students in the school;

d. Review and strengthen school climate and the policies of the school in order to prevent and address harassment, intimidation, or bullying of students;

e. Educate the community, including students, teachers, administrative staff, and parents, to prevent and address harassment, intimidation, or bullying of students;

f. Participate in the training required pursuant to the provisions of N.J.S.A. 18A:37-13 et seq. and other training which the Principal or the district Anti-Bullying Coordinator may request. The School Safety Team shall be provided professional development opportunities that may address effective practices of successful school climate programs or approaches; and

g. Execute such other duties related to harassment, intimidation, or bullying as requested by the Principal or district Anti-Bullying Coordinator.

Notwithstanding any provision of N.J.S.A. 18A:37-21 to the contrary, a parent who is a member of the School Safety Team shall not participate in the activities of the team set forth in 3. a., b., or c. above or any other activities of the team which may compromise the confidentiality of a student, consistent with, at a minimum, the requirements of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (20 U.S.C. Section 1232 and 34 CFR Part 99), N.J.A.C. 6A:32-7, Student Records and N.J.A.C. 6A:14-2.9, Student Records.

G. Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Investigation

The Board requires a thorough and complete investigation to be conducted for each report of violations and complaints which either identify harassment, intimidation, or bullying or describe behaviors that indicate harassment, intimidation, or bullying. The investigation shall be initiated by the Principal or the Principal's designee within one school day of the verbal report of the incident. The investigation shall be conducted by the school Anti-Bullying Specialist in coordination with the Principal. The Principal may appoint additional personnel who are not school Anti-Bullying Specialists to assist with the investigation.

The investigation shall be completed and the written findings submitted to the Principal as soon as possible, but not later than ten school days from the date of the written report of the incident. Should information regarding the reported incident and the investigation be received after the end of the ten-day period, the school Anti-Bullying Specialist shall amend the original report of the results of the investigation to ensure there is an accurate and current record of the facts and activities concerning the reported incident.

The Principal shall proceed in accordance with the Code of Student Conduct, as appropriate, based on the investigation findings. The Principal shall submit the report to the Superintendent within two school days of the completion of the investigation and in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act (N.J.S.A. 52:14B-1 et seq.). As appropriate to the findings from the investigation, the Superintendent shall ensure the Code of Student Conduct has been implemented and may decide to provide intervention services, order counseling, establish training programs to reduce harassment, intimidation, or bullying and enhance school climate, impose discipline, or take or recommend other appropriate action, as necessary.

The Superintendent shall report the results of each investigation to the Board of Education no later than the date of the regularly scheduled Board of Education meeting following the completion of the investigation. The Superintendent's report shall include information on any consequences imposed under the Code of Student Conduct, any services provided, training established, or other action taken or recommended by the Superintendent.

Parents of involved student offenders and targets/victims shall be provided with information about the investigation, in accordance with Federal and State law and regulation. The information to be provided to parents shall include the nature of the investigation, whether the district found evidence of harassment, intimidation, or bullying, and whether consequences were imposed or services provided to address the incident of harassment, intimidation, or bullying. This information shall be provided in writing within five school days after the results of the investigation are reported to the Board of Education.

A parent may request a hearing before the Board of Education after receiving the information about the investigation. The hearing shall be held within ten school days of the request. The Board of Education shall conduct the hearing in executive session, pursuant to the Open Public Meetings Act (N.J.S.A. 10:4-1 et seq.), to protect the confidentiality of the students. At the hearing, the Board may hear testimony from and consider information provided by the school Anti-Bullying Specialist and others, as appropriate, regarding the incident, the findings from the investigation of the incident, recommendations for consequences or services, and any programs instituted to reduce such incidents, prior to rendering a determination.

At the regularly scheduled Board of Education meeting following its receipt of the Superintendent's report on the results of the investigations to the Board or following a hearing in executive session, the Board shall issue a decision, in writing, to affirm, reject, or modify the Superintendent's decision. The Board's decision may be appealed to the Commissioner of Education, in accordance with N.J.A.C. 6A:3, Controversies and Disputes, no later than ninety days after issuance of the Board of Education's decision.

A parent, student or organization may file a complaint with the Division on Civil Rights within one hundred eighty days of the occurrence of any incident of harassment, intimidation, or bullying based on membership in a protected group as enumerated in the "Law Against Discrimination," P.L.1945, c.169 (C.10:5-1 et seq.).

H. Range of Responses to an Incident of Harassment, Intimidation, or Bullying

The Board shall establish a range of responses to harassment, intimidation, and bullying incidents and the Principal and the Anti-Bullying Specialist shall appropriately apply these responses once an incident of harassment, intimidation, or bullying is confirmed. The Superintendent shall respond to confirmed harassment, intimidation, and bullying, according to the parameters described in this Policy. The range of ways in which school staff will respond shall include an appropriate combination of counseling, support services, intervention services, and other programs. The Board recognizes that some acts of harassment, intimidation, or bullying may be isolated incidents requiring the school officials respond appropriately to the individual(s) committing the acts. Other acts may be so serious or parts of a larger pattern of harassment, intimidation, or bullying that they require a response either at the classroom, school building, or school district level or by law enforcement officials.

For every incident of harassment, intimidation, or bullying, the school officials must respond appropriately to the individual who committed the act. The range of responses to confirmed harassment, intimidation, or bullying acts should include individual, classroom, school, or district responses, as appropriate to the findings from each incident. Examples of responses that apply to each of these categories are provided below:

1. Individual responses can include consistent and appropriate positive behavioral interventions (e.g., peer mentoring, short-term counseling, life skills groups) intended to remediate the problem behaviors.

2. Classroom responses can include class discussions about an incident of harassment, intimidation, or bullying, role plays (when implemented with sensitivity to a student's situation or involvement with harassment, intimidation, and bullying), research projects, observing and discussing audio-visual materials on these subjects, and skill-building lessons in courtesy, tolerance, assertiveness, and conflict management.

3. School responses can include theme days, learning station programs, "acts of kindness" programs or awards, use of student survey data to plan prevention and intervention programs and activities, social norms campaigns, posters, public service announcements, "natural helper" or peer leadership programs, "upstander" programs, parent programs, the dissemination of information to students and parents explaining acceptable uses of electronic and wireless communication devices, and harassment, intimidation, and bullying prevention curricula or campaigns.

4. District-wide responses can comprise of adoption of school-wide programs, including enhancing the school climate, involving the community in policy review and development, providing professional development coordinating with community-based organizations (e.g., mental health, health services, health facilities, law enforcement, faith-based organizations), launching harassment, intimidation, and bullying prevention campaigns.

I. Reprisal or Retaliation Prohibited

The Board prohibits a Board member, school employee, contracted service provider who has contact with students, school volunteer, or student from engaging in reprisal, retaliation, or false accusation against a victim, witness, or one with reliable information, or any other person who has reliable information about an act of harassment, intimidation, or bullying or who reports an act of harassment, intimidation, or bullying. The consequence and appropriate remedial action for a person who engages in reprisal or retaliation shall be determined by the administrator after consideration of the nature, severity, and circumstances of the act, in accordance with case law, Federal and State statutes and regulations, and district policies and procedures. All suspected acts of reprisal or retaliation will be taken seriously and appropriate responses will be made in accordance with the totality of the circumstances.

Examples of consequences and remedial measures for students who engage in reprisal or retaliation are listed and described in the Consequences and Appropriate Remedial Actions section of this Policy.

Examples of consequences for a school employee or a contracted service provider who has contact with students who engages in reprisal or retaliation may include, but not be limited to: verbal or written reprimand, increment withholding, legal action, disciplinary action, termination, and/or bans from providing services, participating in school district-sponsored programs, or being in school buildings or on school grounds. Remedial measures may include, but not be limited to: in or out-of-school counseling, professional development programs, and work environment modifications.

Examples of consequences for a Board member who engages in reprisal or retaliation may include, but not be limited to: reprimand, legal action, and other action authorized by statute or administrative code. Remedial measures may include, but not be limited to: counseling and professional development.

J. Consequences and Appropriate Remedial Action for False Accusation

The Board prohibits any person from falsely accusing another as a means of retaliation or as a means of harassment, intimidation, or bullying.

1. Students - Consequences and appropriate remedial action for a student found to have falsely accused another as a means of harassment, intimidation, or bullying or as a means of retaliation may range from positive behavioral interventions up to and including suspension or expulsion, as permitted under N.J.S.A. 18A:37-1 et seq., Discipline of Students and as set forth in N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.2, Short-term Suspensions, N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7, Long-term Suspensions and N.J.A.C. 6A:16-7.5, Expulsions and those listed and described in the Consequences and Appropriate Remedial Actions section of this Policy.

2. School Employees - Consequences and appropriate remedial action for a school employee or contracted service provider who has contact with students found to have falsely accused another as a means of harassment, intimidation, or bullying or as a means of retaliation could entail discipline in accordance with district policies, procedures, and agreements which may include, but not be limited to: reprimand, suspension, increment withholding, termination, and/or bans from providing services, participating in school district-sponsored programs, or being in school buildings or on school grounds. Remedial measures may include, but not be limited to: in or out-of-school counseling, professional development programs, and work environment modifications.

3. Visitors or Volunteers - Consequences and appropriate remedial action for a visitor or volunteer found to have falsely accused another as a means of harassment, intimidation, or bullying or as a means of retaliation could be determined by the school administrator after consideration of the nature, severity, and circumstances of the act, including law enforcement reports or other legal actions, removal of buildings or grounds privileges, or prohibiting contact with students or the provision of student services. Remedial measures may include, but not be limited to: in or out-of-school counseling, professional development programs, and work environment modifications.

K. Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Policy Publication and Dissemination

This Policy will be disseminated annually by the Superintendent to all school employees, contracted service providers who have contact with students, school volunteers, students, and parents who have children enrolled in a school in the district, along with a statement explaining the Policy applies to all acts of harassment, intimidation, or bullying, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:37-14 that occur on school property, at school-sponsored functions, or on a school bus and, as appropriate, acts that occur off school grounds.

The Superintendent shall ensure that notice of this Policy appears in the student handbook and all other publications of the school district that set forth the comprehensive rules, procedures, and standards for schools within the school district.

The Superintendent shall post a link to the district's Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Policy that is prominently displayed on the homepage of the school district's website. The district will notify students and parents this Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Policy is available on the school district's website.

The Superintendent shall post the name, school phone number, school address, and school email address of the district Anti-Bullying Coordinator on the home page of the school district's website. Each Principal shall post the name, school phone number, address, and school email address of both the Anti-Bullying Specialist and the district Anti-Bullying Coordinator on the home page of each school's website.

L. Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Training and Prevention Programs

The Superintendent and Principal(s) shall provide training on the school district's Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Policy to current and new school employees, including administrators, instructors, student support services, administrative/office support, transportation, food service, facilities/maintenance; contracted service providers, and volunteers who have significant contact with students; and persons contracted by the district to provide services to students. The training shall include instruction on preventing bullying on the basis of the protected categories enumerated in N.J.S.A. 18A:37-14 and other distinguishing characteristics that may incite incidents of discrimination, harassment, intimidation, or bullying.

Each public school teacher and educational services professional shall be required to complete at least two hours of instruction in harassment, intimidation, and bullying prevention in within each five year professional development period as part of the professional development requirement pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18:37-22.d. The required two hours of suicide prevention instruction shall include information on the risk of suicide and incidents of harassment, intimidation, or bullying and information on reducing the risk of suicide in students who are members of communities identified as having members at high risk of suicide.

Each newly elected or appointed Board members must complete, during the first year of the member's first term, a training program on harassment, intimidation, and bullying in accordance with the provisions of N.J.S.A. 18A:12-33.

The school district shall provide time during the usual school schedule for the Anti-Bullying Coordinator and each school Anti-Bullying Specialist to participate in harassment, intimidation, and bullying training programs.

A school leader shall complete school leader training that shall include information on the prevention of harassment, intimidation, and bullying as required in N.J.S.A. 18A:26-8.2.

The school district shall annually observe a "Week of Respect" beginning with the first Monday in October. In order to recognize the importance of character education, the school district will observe the week by providing age-appropriate instruction focusing on the prevention of harassment, intimidation, and bullying as defined in N.J.S.A. 18A:37-14. Throughout the school year the district will provide ongoing age-appropriate instruction on preventing harassment, intimidation, or bullying, in accordance with the Core Curriculum Content Standards, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:37-29.

The school district and each school in the district will annually establish, implement, document, and assess harassment, intimidation, and bullying prevention programs or approaches, and other initiatives in consultation

with school staff, students, administrators, volunteers, parents, law enforcement, and community members. The programs or approaches and other initiatives shall be designed to create school-wide conditions to prevent and address harassment, intimidation, and bullying in accordance with the provisions of N.J.S.A. 18A:37-17 et seq.

M. Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Policy Reevaluation, Reassessment and Review

The Superintendent shall develop and implement a process for annually discussing the school district's Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Policy with students.

The Superintendent and the Principal(s) shall annually conduct a reevaluation, reassessment, and review of the Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Policy, with input from the schools' Anti-Bullying Specialists, and recommend revisions and additions to the Policy as well as to harassment, intimidation, and bullying prevention programs and approaches based on the findings from the evaluation, reassessment, and review.

N. Reports to Board of Education and New Jersey Department of Education

The Superintendent shall report two times each school year, between September 1 and January 1 and between January 1 and June 30 at a public hearing all acts of violence, vandalism, and harassment, intimidation, and bullying which occurred during the previous reporting period in accordance with the provisions of N.J.S.A. 18A:17-46. The information shall also be reported to the New Jersey Department of Education in accordance with N.J.S.A. 18A:17-46.

O. School and District Grading Requirements

Each school and each district shall receive a grade for the purpose of assessing their efforts to implement policies and programs consistent with the provisions of N.J.S.A. 18:37-13 et seq. The grade received by a school and the district shall be posted on the homepage of the school's website and the district's website in accordance with the provisions of N.J.S.A. 18A:17-46. A link to the report that was submitted by the Superintendent to the Department of Education shall also be available on the school district's website. This information shall be posted on the websites within ten days of receipt of the grade for each school and the district.

P. Reports to Law Enforcement

Some acts of harassment, intimidation, and bullying may be bias-related acts and potentially bias crimes and school officials must report to law enforcement officials either serious acts or those which may be part of a larger pattern in accordance with the provisions of the Memorandum of Agreement Between Education and Law Enforcement Officials.

Q. Collective Bargaining Agreements and Individual Contracts

Nothing in N.J.S.A. 18A:37-13.1 et seq. may be construed as affecting the provisions of any collective bargaining agreement or individual contract of employment in effect on the Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights Act's effective date (January 5, 2011). N.J.S.A. 18A:37-30.

The Board of Education prohibits the employment of or contracting for school staff positions with individuals whose criminal history record check reveals a record of conviction for a crime of bias intimidation or conspiracy to commit or attempt to commit a crime of bias intimidation.

R. Students with Disabilities

Nothing contained in N.J.S.A. 18A:37-13.1 et seq. may alter or reduce the rights of a student with a disability with regard to disciplinary actions or to general or special education services and supports. N.J.S.A. 18A:37-32.

The school district shall submit all subsequent amended Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Policies to the Executive County Superintendent of Schools within thirty days of Board adoption.

NJ High School Graduation Requirements

One important facet of Hillsborough Township Public School's educational mission is to prepare students for a successful transition to high school and ultimately, successful graduation from high school. For your reference, the following chart describes the projected high school graduation requirements:

SCIENCE	15 credits including at least five credits in laboratory biology/life science or the content equivalent**; an additional laboratory/inquiry-based science course including chemistry, environmental science, or physics; and a third laboratory/inquiry-based science course
SOCIAL STUDIES	15 credits including satisfaction of N.J.S.A. 18A:35-1 and 2; five credits in world history; and the integration of civics, economics, geography and global content in all course offerings
FINANCIAL, ECONOMIC, BUSINESS, AND ENTREPRENEURIAL LITERACY	2.5 credits
HEALTH, SAFETY, AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION	3 ¾ credits in health, safety, and physical education during each year of enrollment, distributed as 150 minutes per week, as required by N.J.S.A. 18A:35-5, 7 and 8
VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS	5 credits
WORLD LANGUAGES	5 credits or student demonstration of proficiency
TECHNOLOGICAL LITERACY	Consistent with the Core Curriculum Content Standards, integrated throughout the curriculum
21st CENTURY LIFE AND CAREERS, OR CAREER- TECHNICAL EDUCATION	5 credits
TOTAL CREDITS (State Minimum)	120 credits***

* School districts may establish course and/or credit requirements which exceed the State minimums.

** "Content equivalent" means courses or activities that include the same or equivalent knowledge and skills as those found in traditionally titled courses which are required for high school graduation and which are aligned with the Core Curriculum Content Standards. This content must be taught by certified teachers, may be integrated in one or more courses, may be titled differently, or may present material in an interdisciplinary or spiral format.

*** The 120 credit total is greater than the sum of the individual requirements above, to allow for student electives.
